Continuing to care for you at Cookham Practice

We are very sad to announce that Dr Susanna Hayter will be retiring from the medical centre at the end of July 2014, after nearly nine years at the surgery. Dr Hayter came to the surgery in 2003 as our GP Registrar and after a short period working elsewhere returned to take up her partnership in 2005. She will be leaving to spend more time with her young family.

We are also sad to announce that Dr Peter Roberts will be retiring from the medical centre at the end of August 2014, after twelve years at the surgery. Dr Roberts came to the surgery also as our GP Registrar in 2002 and took up his full time position as partner in 2003. Dr Roberts and his family will be moving away from Berkshire at the end of August. In the mean time Drs Hayter and Roberts will continue to work in their normal capacity. Both Dr Hayter and Dr Roberts will be very sad to say goodbye to all of their patients and colleagues after many happy years at Cookham Medical Centre. Many of us have benefitted from either working with them or receiving their care and guidance, and as with Dr Cathie Scothorne, (who left in March), they will be missed enormously. We are delighted to announce that Dr Anu Swamy will be joining Dr Azmy Birdi and Dr Michael Sealy in Partnership from the end of July 2014. She is well known to all of the patients at Cookham Medical Centre and we are delighted that she will be joining the senior team at the surgery.

We are also delighted to announce that Dr Lucy Follis will be joining our team of doctors permanently from the end of July 2014. Many of you will know Lucy as she is currently our excellent GP Registrar and is very pleased to be taking up her new position as Salaried Doctor with Drs Birdi, Sealy and Swamy.

How will this affect patients?

Patients are registered with Cookham Medical Centre and are free to see any GP of your choice. However, it does help us administratively to allocate patients to a "usual" GP therefore, if you usually see Dr Hayter you will be nominally reallocated to Dr Swamy or Dr Follis from 1st August 2014.

We are currently recruiting a replacement partner for Dr Roberts and will inform you when we have more news as soon as possible. We recognise changes to the GP team can be unsettling for patients but we are very pleased that our current team is evolving and that Drs Birdi, Sealy, Swamy and Follis are able provide our patients with the highest standard of care and continuity of our comprehensive service during this time of change. The amount of GP appointments and access to your GPs will not be reduced.

We would also like to announce that Mrs Sarah Denton will be starting as our full-time Practice Manager in early June 2014. Mr Bill Jenssen will be staying to help Sarah settle into her new position on a part-time basis.

Nurse Jane Chappell will be retiring at the end of May 2014 to spend more time with her family. We are currently recruiting a replacement RGN and will inform you when we have more news. Our Health Care Assistants Margaret Witherspoon and Claire Williams left the nursing team in April 2014 and we are delighted that Christine Penny has taken over care of their patients and we are very pleased to announce that Mrs Sam Robinson will be joining as our new Health Care Assistant in mid June 2014. We would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your cooperation in this transitional period.

Is Cookham so very different?

The Cookham practice is part of Windsor and Maidenhead (WAM) Clinical Commissioning Group. When the EAST Berkshire Primary Care Trust was dissolved in April of last year, it was replaced by 3 CCGs in Slough, WAM and Bracknell Forest. The areas were dictated by the local authority structure.

As these are small areas, some services are commissioned by the East Berkshire consortium. Other specialist services are commissioned over an even larger area. As the leaders of the CCG include general practitioners, GP services are currently commissioned centrally for the NHS.

The central money available to a practice like Cookham is determined by a national formula, which prioritises funding to the area according to perceived need. Because this is a relatively affluent area, our funding is among the lowest per head in the country. This is an understandable approach, although one could argue about whether the formula is right.

The pressure on local services is increased as action is taken to move some activities from secondary care (hospital) to primary care (GP practices and local clinics). The politicians' plan to introduce seven-day working and increase hours to 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Even if pro-rata funding were to be made available for these extra services (very unlikely) there is a national shortage of GPs, which can not be corrected in the short term.

Analysis of appointments in general practice shows that there are MORE appointments provided year on year. In spite of this it is more difficult to get an appointment. This is true, not only in Cookham, but nationally. Your PPG is part of a local network of patient groups in Windsor and Maidenhead. The other practices are reporting similar concerns from patients.

The CCGs of East Berkshire are working closely together to address the challenges that face the NHS. Although each CCG will have its own strategy, there will be much in common.

As you are aware, the NHS has serious financial pressures. These have resulted in some truly dreadful instances of poor service, including national scandals. The challenge is to improve services and save money. It is therefore inevitable that the way services are delivered will come under scrutiny. This will mean that some things may have to change.

Change can mean improvement!

You will see from Dr Robert's article on Page 1, that a number of changes are already taking place. Some of these are clearly as a result of individuals leaving and others joining. The overall effect of the changes means that there is NO reduction in the number of appointments offered, nor is there a plan to merge with any other practice.

The introduction of seven-day working will place considerable pressure on small practices. Various ways are being considered to meet the new challenges. These include:

- Collaboration between neighbouring practices to provide extended hours cover.
- Increased use of St Marks hospital for primary care clinics
- Increased use of Urgent Care Centres (including St Mark's) to reduce pressure on A&E at Wexham.

Of course the management changes at Heatherwood and Wexham may mean other changes as well.

Your PPG is monitoring the situation and will keep you informed as ideas are turned into plans. We have confidence that the Practice team in Cookham are as well equipped to cope with the changes as any practice.

We can understand that the number of changes occurring at this time is giving some of you cause for concern. As is usually the case, we believe that the rumours greatly overstate the position. (It would seem that GPs could be more skilled at Public Relations!) Communication between the practice and the public is one of the roles of the PPG. This newsletter is one way for us to do that.

New technology

The PPG interviewed the two main contenders and added their recommendations to the conclusions of the staff. We hope that a new system will be installed in the very near future. We will advise you how to make the best use of the new facilities.

On-line renewal of prescriptions will be introduced shortly, after it has been tested extensively to ensure that there are no hidden problems.
