Work advances on Stanley Spencer and Kenneth Grahame projects

Back on 2008 we reported our ideas to the AGM on these two projects. After three years of patient research we are now making progress and believe the next twelve months should tell us whether they are viable. The first proposal is to work jointly with other local organisations for a statue of the late artist in Cookham. The second is a tribute to Kenneth Grahame's much-loved "Wind in the Willows" – and we have been strongly supported by the Kenneth Grahame Society who are coming to Cookham for their AGM in September.

We plan a wide-ranging fund raising campaign to cover the costs, if we can secure the preferred locations. Our initial discussions with landowners have been positive.

During the year we have also worked on other local environment issues, which have included dog fouling, flooding, village signage and the Marsh Meadow children's nature reserve. We welcome input from members on these and any other environmental issues.

CAUSEWAY CLOSURE CAUSES CONCERN

News that the Royal Borough does not intend to open the Causeway across the Moor during flood conditions has raised concerns among people in Cookham about access when roads into the village are inundated. Newspaper reports before Christmas cited a risk assessment, which has not been made publicly available, and, at the time this newsletter went to press, no information had been given to villagers about how they will be able to get in or out, what provision will be made for the emergency services or how the needs of the village's care homes will be addressed.

Jean Stretton, the Society's retiring President, who has lived in Cookham for more than 50 years, said: "The situation is extremely worrying. It is guite unacceptable that the Council should allow us to be cut off in this way."
