#### VISIT TO ST BENOIT – October 2011

St Benoit is "la ville au fil de l'eau" or the town in the flow. Here the stream is actually a fast moving river, and in October Cookham Twinning made its biennial journey by car, boat and plane to visit its twinned village just outside Poitiers.

Friday evening arrival was the time for old reunions and new introductions at the civic reception hosted by the Mayor of St Benoit. All visiting families were presented with beautifully illustrated books of St Benoit created



following a project in the local primary school.

Everyone was up early on Saturday morning for a drive to the famous town of Cognac. The morning visit took us through the art of barrel making, demonstrating the shaping and shaving of the oak wood that must come from Limousin or Troncais. Some of us were given

the opportunity to try our hand and learn new skills, although the process remains one for skilled artisans, which most of us were not!

After an excellent lunch at the Globe restaurant that had set up a welcome slide show featuring both the menu and pictures of St Benoit and Cookham, we went on a tour of Cognac on the tourist train. Blessed with brilliant sunshine, there was much to see and enjoy, including rowers on the river and the attractive Town Hall grounds.

The train dropped us off at the Martell distillery, the oldest Cognac house in town, having been founded by Jean Martell in 1715, and which is now owned by Pernod Ricard. More education followed about Ugni Blanc grapes, double distillation methods, types of soil, and transportation on the Charente River that flows through Cognac.

Cellar masters have the job of mixing exactly the right blends of batches to create the perfect taste and flavour, whether for XO (extra old), VSOP (very special old pale) or other qualities. The designations XO, VSOP etc are in English as most of the initial trades and trading posts were created by people from Britain.

The evening concert in St. Benoit church, with Genevieve Usher, Rebecca



McGrath and Chris Underhill was a highlight of the trip. We were particularly grateful to Rebecca for making the trip with her harp which added a further dimension to the enjoyment of the evening.

Sunday was a day to spend time with family hosts. Another day of bright sunshine, many took the opportunity to make a walking tour of Poitiers, taking in Notre-Dame-La-Grande cathedral and other sights.

Then our final evening social with lots of conviviality, good food and an entertaining live band. We were given bottles of wine, 'vignifie et mis en

bouteille par le comite de jumilage'. The grapes had been grown in St Benoit from vines given to them by the village of Lossch, their German twinning partner.

Monday morning was an early start again for some of us as we set off back to Calais. Another most enjoyable twinning weekend completed with friends old and new, and with links between Cookham and St Benoit strengthened once again.
